His machine has been eximined by several gentlemen who are Fellows of the Royal Society, who have been pleased to speak in its praise in terms of the highest panegyrie. He exhibited his Diving Cap in the river Nen, which runs from Wishech to Northampton, at a place called Peerles 5Pool, in a depth of 29 feet water, and continued under water three hours and seventeen minutes, traversing up and down the river near two miles, picking up, as he went, fossis, which he conveyed to the fursace of the water by a string made of a fine cord and a cork, which shoated as soon as he let them go out of his hand, and entertained a most numerous company of spectators with feveral experiments, while he was thus employed in exploring a passage which never before was explored by mortals.
